VOTER REGISTRATION FORMS**1) Where can voter registration forms be obtained?****(a) In Person.**

- (i) At the office of the local election authority. A county-by-county listing of the local offices is available at <http://sos.mo.gov/elections/countyclerks.asp>;
- (ii) At any Department of Motor Vehicles; or
- (iii) At any state agency, that provides a service to the public (WIC, Social Services, etc.).

(b) Online.

- (i) By using the Missouri Voter Registration Application. It can be obtained at the Secretary of State's website: http://www.sos.mo.gov/forms/elections/MVRA_PC_231-0169_042007.pdf. It must be printed out and mailed to the appropriate local election authority (a county-by-county listing is available at: <http://sos.mo.gov/elections/countyclerks.asp>);
- (ii) By requesting that a Voter-Registration Application be sent to you. This request can be made online at: <https://www.sos.mo.gov/firstvote/students/request.asp>; or
- (iii) By using the National Voter Registration Form available at: <http://www.fabnit.com/nvra-update-09-12-06.pdf>.

2) Are there restrictions on registering to vote using a photocopied voter registration form?

(a) Yes. Missouri Law specifies the type and size of paper upon which Postcard Voter Applications and Forms must be printed. Only election authorities and the Secretary of State are authorized to print and distribute these forms. Individuals, groups and corporations who print the form must get permission from the Secretary of State. Individuals and groups can request and obtain a sufficient number of Missouri Voter Registration Applications from any election authority.

(b) However, as noted above, the Missouri Voter Registration Application can be obtained at the Secretary of State's website: http://www.sos.mo.gov/forms/elections/MVRA_PC_231-0169_042007.pdf. Applicants are expected to print and mail it to the appropriate local election authority. Missouri law does not address whether only applicants may print the application or whether third parties can print them off for others.

3) Are there any restrictions on using the National Voter Registration Form?

(a) **Yes.** The National Voter Registration Form requires that applicants follow both the federal instructions and also the separate state instructions. Missouri has special instructions which are found at the end of the National Voter Registration Form.

(b) Missouri's special instructions.

(i) **I.D. number:** The applicant is required to include his driver's license number and last four digits of his social security number on the form. If the individual is lacking either of these numbers then he is instructed to write "NONE" in the applicable sections of the form, and then the state will issue him a unique I.D. number.

(ii) **Choice of party:** The applicant does not have to choose a party to vote in the primary election, caucus, or convention.

(iii) **Race of ethnic group:** Missouri instructs the applicant to leave this section blank.

(iv) **Signature and Missouri's specific requirements to register to vote:** Before "signing" the form the applicant should refer to the State Instructions and make sure that he or she meets the 7 listed requirements.

(A) That he or she is a citizen of the United States;

(B) That he or she is a resident of Missouri;

(C) That he or she is at least 17-1/2 years of age (a person must be 18 to vote);

(D) That he or she is not on probation or parole after conviction of a felony, until finally discharged from such probation or parole;

(E) That he or she has not been convicted of a felony or misdemeanor in connection with the right of suffrage;

(F) That he or she has not been adjudged incapacitated by any court of law; and

(G) That he or she has not been confined under a sentence of imprisonment.

(v) **Mailing address:** Once completed, the form should be sent to:

4) Are there restrictions regarding the use of registration form information?

(a) **Yes.**

(i) What is allowed?

(A) Copying completed registration forms prior to submitting them to the board;

(B) The election authority placing all the information on registration cards in computerized form (in accordance with Mo. Ann. Stat. §115.158); and selling this information for a fee.

(ii) What is not allowed?

(A) The computerized information from the registration cards cannot be distributed through the internet.

(B) Registration information may not be provided to the public.

(C) The information cannot be used for "commercial purposes". This restriction is subject to chapter 610.

(b) **Certain individuals can apply to the circuit court in their jurisdiction to have their information closed to the public:** Such individuals include undercover officers of a

local, state, or federal law enforcement agency, those in the witness protection programs, and victims of domestic violence.

5) Are there restrictions regarding pre-filling information on voter registration forms?

(a) **No.** You can pre-fill information on voter registration forms.

COMPLETING VOTER REGISTRATION FORMS

6) How long must you live in a county before you are eligible to register to vote?

(a) **General rule:** Missouri law requires an individual to be a resident in order to register to vote.

(b) **No specific minimum amount of time:** The law does not specify how much time must pass before an individual is considered a resident. The law only requires that new voters must be registered by the voter registration deadline.

7) Are there any restrictions on registering to vote using a P.O. Box, college campus, or dorm address?

(a) **The rule for applicants who have both a home address and a mailing address:**

Voters who are either using a P.O. Box or temporarily living and receiving mail at a different address than their home address, must include both addresses on their voter registration form. This applies to both the National Registration Form and the Missouri Voter Registration Form. Both forms have two address sections, one for the applicant's "home address" and one for the applicant's "mailing address".

(i) **Home address:** In this section the applicant should write the street address of their principle place of residence, regardless of whether the applicant currently receives mail there. It does not matter if the applicant is not receiving mail at that location, since this information is not used by the state for mailing, but rather for determining the voter's residency.

(ii) **Mailing Address:** The applicant's P.O. Box, college campus address, dorm address, or temporary address (if the voter has one) should be indicated here.

8) If I enter or leave the state for work or school, can I register to vote?

(a) **General information.**

(i) **Residence:** A person's voting address is determined based on his or her residence. A residence is any place where a person lives with the intent of staying. A person can reside at an address and leave for a period of time, e.g. to attend college. However, as long as the person has the intention of returning, that address may be considered his or her residence. A person is eligible to register and vote in the county he or she considers his or her residence. If a person is away from his or her residence, he or she may vote by absentee ballot. **See question 8(c)** below talking about how Missouri's Supreme Court has liberally construed the residency requirement.

(ii) **Students:** Students who want to vote are protected by the Equal Protection Clause of the Fourteenth Amendment to the United States Constitution. This means that they cannot be treated differently than any other citizen when it comes to voting. Specifically, students should be neither (1) forced to fill out additional information that non-students do not have to fill out nor (2) be required

by election officials to fulfill additional obligations that non-students do not have to satisfy.

(A) Non-Missouri residents attending college in Missouri: The Secretary of State's website states that these students can either register to vote at their Missouri residence or can keep their residence in their home state and vote by absentee ballot.

(B) Missouri resident attending college in Missouri: If the student is attending college in a different county than the county he or she is registered in, that student can choose to register either at his or her college residence or his or her home residence.

Again if the voter is going to be absent from his or her jurisdiction on Election Day, he or she can vote by absentee ballot.

(C) Missouri resident attending college in another state: The website states that a student who is a Missouri resident, but who is attending school in another state, may register to vote from his or her Missouri residence and can then vote by absentee ballot.

(b) Only one vote: No individual can register and vote in two places.

9) Are there any I.D. requirements to register to vote?

(a) Yes.

(i) When an applicant registers in person: Applicants registering in person with an election authority or a deputy registration official will be asked for identification at the time of registration and must present one of the following:

(A) A copy of a birth certificate;

(B) Native American tribal document;

(C) Other proof of United States citizenship;

(D) A valid Missouri driver's license; or

(E) Other form of personal identification at the time of registration.

(ii) When an applicant registers by mail or registers in person with a third-party group: If a voter is registering for the first time, and is doing so by mail, Missouri's voter registration application requests that the voter submit with their mail-in registration form a copy of one of the forms of identification listed above in **question 9(a)(i)**. However, submitting a copy of this identification is listed as optional on Missouri's voter registration application.

10) Are there any I.D. requirements in order to vote?

(a) Yes. Missouri recently passed a law requiring photo identification for all voters when voting at the polls.

(b) Voters must present one of the following at the polls:

(i) A non-expired Missouri driver's license showing the name and a photograph or digital image of the individual;

(ii) A non-expired Missouri non-driver's license showing the name and a photographic or digital image of the individual;

(iii) A document that satisfies all of the following requirements:

(A) The document contains the name of the individual to whom the document was issued, and the name substantially conforms to the most recent signature in the individual's voter registration record;

(B) The document shows a photographic or digital image of the individual;

(C) The document includes an expiration date, and the document is not expired, or if expired, expired not before the date of the most recent general election; and

(D) The document was issued by the United States or the state of Missouri; or

(iv) Any identification containing a photographic or digital image of the individual which is issued by the Missouri National Guard, the United States Armed Forces, or the United States Department of Veteran Affairs to a member or former member of the Missouri National Guard or the United States Armed Forces and that does not have an expiration date.

(c) Exemptions.

(i) For those with mental or physical disabilities, those born on or before January 1, 1941, and those with a religious belief against photographic identification. These individuals can cast provisional ballots, provided they sign affidavits affirming the reason for their failure to provide any of the identification listed above.

(ii) For a voter who does not bring the proper identification, the voter can cast a provisional ballot, but the vote will not be counted unless the voter returns to the polling place with a proper form of identification and the provisional ballot otherwise qualifies under Mo. Ann. Stat. 115.430.

(iii) For any election held on or before November 1, 2008, if a voter arrives at a polling place without proper identification, the voter may cast a provisional ballot after:

(A) Executing an affidavit which is also signed by two supervising election judges, one from each major political party, who attest that they have personal knowledge of the identity of the voter, or

(1) Executing an affidavit affirming the voter's identity (See Mo. Ann. Stat. § 115.427.14 regarding the content of said affidavit); and

(2) Presenting a form of identification from the following list:

(a) Identification issued by the State of Missouri, an agency of the state, or a local election authority of the state;

(b) Identification issued by the United States government or agency thereof;

(c) Identification issued by an institution of higher education that is located in Missouri;

(d) A copy of a current utility bill, bank statement, government check, paycheck, or other government document that contains the name and address of the applicant; or

(e) A driver's license or state identification card issued by another state.

11) What are the rules regarding missing or illegible information on registration forms?

(a) **No specific law:** Missouri does not have a specific statute dealing with missing or illegible information on registration forms, but the statutes do provide guidance on issues that could arise due to missing or illegible information.

(b) **Undeliverable verification notice:** Within seven (7) days of receiving an applicant's completed and signed registration form, the county election authority will send the voter a verification notice, letting the voter know if he or she is registered to vote. If such notice is returned as undeliverable by the postal service within the time established by the election

authority, the election authority shall not place the applicant's name on the voter registration file.

(c) If the election authority determines that an applicant is not entitled to register.

(i) In general: If the election authority receives the voter registration application and determines that an applicant is not entitled to register, then the authority must notify the applicant by mail and explain the reason that he or she is not entitled. The applicant has the right to have this determination reviewed pursuant to Mo. Ann. Stat. § 115.223.

(ii) If the applicant failed to answer the question concerning United States citizenship: The election authority must notify the applicant and give him or her the opportunity to complete the form in a timely manner so that he or she will meet the registration deadline.

(d) If the applicant registering to vote does so in person and is unable to write: Then the election official will fill in the registration cards, and the applicant can sign by mark, witnessed by the election official. The election official is required to note the applicant's height, weight, eye color, and other distinguishing characteristics.

12) Can a person register to change his or her name by filling out a voter registration form?

(a) Yes. Must notify election authority: If a registered voter obtains a lawful name change, including a change because of marriage, the voter shall notify the election authority of such change and the election authority shall, upon notification, enter the change on the voter's registration cards. After filling in the voter's new name and transferring other necessary information from the voter's previous registration cards to a new set of cards, the election authority may send new cards to the voter for signature or may require the voter to sign new cards at the polls. If the election authority does require the voter to sign new cards, the new cards shall become the voter's official registration cards.

(b) Applicant can vote in one (1) election under the previous name: A registered voter who obtains a lawful name change may, after notifying the election judges of the name change, vote at one election under the previous name. The election judges shall notify the election authority of the voter's name change and the election authority shall enter the change on the voter's registration cards as provided for in this section.

REGISTERING OTHERS TO VOTE

13) What are the laws regarding third party registration?

(a) Government agencies that accept applications.

(i) Time limits.

(A) Government agencies in general: Voter registration agencies and sites, the division of motor vehicle, and the drivers licensing of the department of revenue, must transmit the complete voter registration application forms to the appropriate election authority no later than FIVE (5) BUSINESS DAYS after the form is completed by the applicant.

(B) Registration applications accepted in the driver's licensing process: Shall be transmitted to the election authority no later than FIVE (5) BUSINESS DAYS after the form is completed.

(b) Private parties that register others.

(i) Compensation is not allowed if: It is based on the number of voters registered, registration applications collected, or registration applications submitted.

(ii) Those who submit forms for others cannot conceal, destroy, or deface the applications.

(iii) Time Limit: Anyone who accepts a voter registration application from another person and agrees or offers to turn it in to the election authority for that voter must deliver the application to the election authority WITHIN SEVEN (7) DAYS OF ACCEPTING OR RECEIVING THE APPLICATION.

(c) Postcard Application Forms (Missouri Voter Registration Applications).

(i) Distribution of Postcard Application Forms.

(A) Printing and distribution: Can only be done by the election authorities and the Secretary of State.

(B) Private parties, groups and corporations: Can ask for and receive a sufficient number of Missouri Voter Registration Applications.

(ii) Delivery of Postcard Application Form(s) by third parties: Completed and signed postcard application form(s) may be delivered to the appropriate election authority by a third party.

14) Are there any laws regarding the submission of voter registration forms by individuals receiving compensation?

(a) Yes.

(i) No compensation if: COMPENSATION IS PAID ON A PER APPLICATION BASIS, i.e., \$1 for every voter registration form submitted. No one registering voters can be paid based on the number of voters registered, registration applications collected, or registration applications submitted to election officials.

(ii) If the third-party is paid or compensated for soliciting more than ten (10) voter registration applications: Then Missouri law requires that (other than governmental agencies and those working for governmental agencies) third-party to be registered with the state as a "Voter Registration Solicitor."

15) Is training or registration with the state required for registration drives?

(a) No training is required.

(b) Registration is required if being compensated: The Secretary of State has a statewide form for those wishing to conduct registration drives and receiving compensation. **See**

Question 14. It is available online.

(i) Registration requirements.

(A) Signing an oath and affirmation; and

(B) Providing the following information:

(1) The name of the voter registration solicitor (the person wishing to conduct the voter registration drive);

(2) His or her residential address, including street number, city, state, and zip code;

(3) His or her mailing address, if different from the residential address;

(4) Whether the voter registration solicitor expects to be paid for soliciting voter registrations;

(5) The identity of the payor (employer), if the voter registration solicitor expects to be paid; and

- (6) The signature of the voter registration solicitor.
- (C) The above must be submitted with an oath and affirmation stating; “I HEREBY SWEAR OR AFFIRM UNDER PENALTY OF PERJURY THAT ALL STATEMENTS MADE BY ME ARE TRUE AND CORRECT.”

16) Are volunteers or staff of voter registration drives required to be county or state residents?

- (a) **Residency requirements only apply to those receiving compensation.**
 - (i) **State resident? Yes.** A voter registration solicitor must be at least eighteen years of age and must be a registered voter in the State of Missouri.
 - (ii) **County resident? No.**

REGISTRATION DEADLINES

17) What is the deadline to register to vote?

- (a) **Dates for 2008.**
 - (i) **Voter Registration Deadline:** October 8, 2008 for the November 4, 2008 General Election.
 - (ii) **General Election:** November 4, 2008.
See <http://www.sos.mo.gov/elections/calendar/2008cal.asp> for more dates.
- (b) **The rule on finding the date for the registration deadline:** To vote in the jurisdiction in which he or she is a resident, the applicant must register no later than 5:00 p.m., or the normal closing time of any public building where the registration is being held if that building is open later, on the fourth Wednesday before the election. In no case shall registration for an election extend beyond 10:00 p.m. on the fourth Wednesday prior to the election. Any person registering after such date is eligible to vote in the next election.
- (c) **Exceptions:** There are exceptions to the registration deadline for voters who fit into one of the three (3) categories listed below
 - (i) **“Interstate Former Resident”**
 - (A) **Definition:** A former resident and registered voter in Missouri who moves from Missouri to another state after the deadline to register to vote in any presidential election in the new state and who otherwise possesses the qualifications to register and vote in that state.
 - (B) **Rule:** These voters can vote by absentee ballot, but only for presidential and vice presidential electors.
 - (ii) **“Intrastate New Resident”**
 - (A) **Definition:** A registered voter of Missouri who moves from one election authority's jurisdiction in Missouri to another election authority's jurisdiction in Missouri after the last day on which he or she could register to vote in an election.
 - (B) **Rule:** As long as he or she otherwise possess the qualifications to vote in the election, this voter can vote by absentee ballot at the election for:
 - (1) Presidential and vice presidential electors;
 - (2) United States senator;
 - (3) Representative in Congress; and
 - (4) Statewide elected officials and statewide questions, propositions and amendments from his or her new jurisdiction of

residence after he or she has registered to vote in his or her new jurisdiction of residence.

(iii) New resident.

(A) Definition: A person who moves to Missouri after the last date on which he or she could register to vote in any presidential election.

(B) Rule: After registering to vote in his or her new jurisdiction of residence, he or she can vote by absentee ballot, but only for presidential and vice presidential electors.

18) Must the organization or individuals engaged in voter registration drives submit their forms within a certain period of time?

(a) Individuals and organizations must submit applications within seven days of completion.

19) Election Day Registration?

(a) Rule: Election Day Registration is not an option in Missouri. Individuals who register to vote on Election Day will not be able to vote in that election.

(b) Definition: Election Day Registration is an option in some states and allows eligible voters to register and vote on the same day.

20) Does Missouri election law allow for early voting or absentee voting?

(a) Early Voting? No. Missouri repealed their Advanced (Early) Voting rule in 2006.

(b) Absentee Voting? Yes.

(i) Who is eligible?

(A) General rule: Any voter registered to vote in Missouri may vote absentee for all candidates and issues if the voter cannot go to the polls for any of the following reasons:

(1) Absence on Election Day from the jurisdiction of the election authority in which such voter is registered to vote;

(2) Incapacity or confinement due to illness or physical disability—this includes a person who is primarily responsible for the physical care of a person who is incapacitated or confined due to illness or disability;

(3) Religious belief or practice;

(4) Being employed as an election authority, as a member of an election authority, or by an election authority at a location other than such voter's polling place; or

(5) Incarceration, provided all qualifications for voting are retained.

(B) Note: There are specific and detailed rules for persons in the Federal Service, intrastate former residents, intrastate new residents, and new residents. See Mo. Ann. Stat. §§ 115.275.6, 115.277.2 for the rules regarding persons in the Federal Service and see **Question 17** for the rules regarding intrastate former residents, intrastate new residents, and new residents.

(ii) How to apply for an absentee ballot: A voter may apply in person, by mail, by fax (if available), or through his or her guardian or relative within a second degree if that guardian or relative applies in person.

(iii) Where to send or take the application: To the election authority of the jurisdiction in which the person is or would be registered. Not to the Secretary of

State's office. See <http://www.sos.mo.gov/elections/countyclerks.asp?id=all> for a list of locations and mailing addresses.

(iv) Required form and contents of the application: An application must

(A) Be in writing; and

(B) Must state:

(1) The applicant's name;

(2) Address at which he or she is or would be registered;

(3) His or her reason for voting an absentee ballot; and

(4) The address to which the ballot is to be mailed, if mailing is requested.

(C) Note: There are additional rules for primary elections.

(v) If the voter registered to vote by mail and is voting for the first time: The voter is required to provide a copy of the voter's identification along with the absentee ballot request unless the voter provided a copy with the voter registration application.

(vi) Deadline to apply to vote by absentee:

(A) General rule.

(1) If the absentee application is submitted by mail, by fax, or by a guardian or relative then it cannot be submitted after 5:00 p.m. on the Wednesday immediately before an election.

(2) If the absentee application is submitted by the applicant in person then it cannot be submitted after 5:00 p.m. on the day before the election.

(a) Exception: For the three (3) groups of voters described in Question 17 (See Mo. Ann. Stat. § 115.275 for definitions of these groups).

(i) New residents and intrastate new residents:

Have to submit their application in person at the election authority in the election jurisdiction in which the applicant resides no later than 7:00 p.m. on the day of the election.

(ii) Interstate former residents must either:

(A) Submit their absentee ballot applications to the election authority where they were formerly registered by 5:00 p.m. on the Wednesday before the election; or

(B) They can submit it in person by 7:00 p.m. on Election Day.

(vii) If the voter fails to state on the ballot envelope the voter's reason for voting by absentee: The absentee ballot cannot be rejected.

(viii) How to use the absentee ballot.

(A) Filling it out: The ballot should be marked in secret and returned to the ballot envelope, sealed, and the statement on the ballot envelope filled out.

(1) Exception for those who are blind, unable to read English, or are physically incapable of voting: In this situation the voter may select someone to aid them. The person who is aiding the voter may not coerce or make suggestions to the voter.

(B) Returning it: Return it to the election authority in the ballot envelope. It can be returned in one of the following ways:

(1) In person:

- (a) By the voter; or
- (b) By the voter's relative (if the relative is within the second degree of consanguinity or affinity); or

(2) By mail:

- (a) By a registered carrier; or
- (b) By a team of deputy election authorities.

(3) Note: It can be faxed in specific circumstances.

(ix) Affidavits.

(A) General rule: Each person voting an absentee ballot shall be subscribed and sworn to before the election official that receives the ballot, a notary public or other officer authorized by law to administer oaths.

(1) Exception: If the voter's reason for voting is because of incapacity or confinement caused by illness or physical disability then the voter does not need to fulfill the affidavit requirement.

(B) What must be in the Affidavit: See Mo. Ann. Stat. § 115:283.

(c) Obtaining forms online.

(i) Voters can download absentee ballot request forms from the Secretary of State. See <http://www.sos.mo.gov/forms/elections/absentee.pdf>.

VOTER REGISTRATION LEGISLATION

21) Is there any pending legislation? If so, where is it in the legislative process?

(a) Legislation waiting to become effective: There are two (2) pieces of legislation that will become effective on August 28, 2008.

(i) S.B. 1083: Affects individuals who request fifty (50) or more voter registration applications and are not deputy registration officials.

(A) Rules:

- (1) Must be 18;
- (2) Must file with the Secretary of State the following information;
 - (a) Name;
 - (b) Address;
 - (c) Telephone number; and
 - (d) Whether the individual is requesting these applications on behalf of a group or organization

(i) If yes, then the individual must include a description of each group or organization the individual is making the request for. This description must include a signed affirmation that the information submitted is true

(B) Training: The Secretary of State will provide these individuals with computer-based training on registering people to vote.

(ii) S.B. 1236: This act allows voters to receive voter registration applications along with their hunting and fishing permits. It requires vendors to forward the applications to the elections authority.

(b) Legislation not on the calendar: There is also legislation that has been proposed, but is not currently on the calendar. This list includes:

22) Applicable statutes?

23) Is there an elections official contact that is helpful?
